Message from the Director of Education

The 2020-2021 school year was one of a kind; but even in the midst of a world-wide pandemic, we had great confidence that our Catholic school community would pull together to embark on a school year like no other.

We developed and were confident in our return to school plan and our readiness for in-person teaching and learning. Every possible measure, following guidance from the Ministry of Education and Public Health, was in place in our schools and worksites to ensure they were as safe as possible. Our school teams allocated a professional activity day to review and discuss the safety protocols that were put in place over the summer.

One of our most remarkable achievements was the creation of our virtual school, St. Kateri Tekakwitha Virtual Catholic School, to provide access to remote learning for all students from Kindergarten to Grade 8.

Fittingly, the part of our Board Vision Statement that we chose to animate was "open to mystery and endless discovery in the Lord, we are called to *love unconditionally*."

The pandemic caused us to feel fear and anxiety—a global virus for which there was (at the time) no known vaccine threatened us and our loved ones, especially our elderly and immunocompromised.

Self-discipline, self-regulation and evidence-informed action were some of the practical ways we modelled calm for our students in the midst of their fears, and *unconditional love* addressed those fears head on. In 1 John 4:18, we are taught, "perfect love casts out fear."

What did perfect love look like at RCCDSB schools in 2020–21? Empathetic listening and informed dialogue. Unconditional love exemplified and practiced by staff as they worked with students who were not engaged in online learning. Unconditional love demonstrated through the mercy that we showed one another, and that which is modelled to us by our Father in heaven.

It was indeed a school year filled with endless mystery, discovery and unconditional love. As you will read in this Annual Report, we completed the 2020–2021 school year journey as a Christian community 'together and imperfectly through the grace of God.'



WHOLENESS & WELLNESS

Safety during a global pandemic

Safe, healthy environments was job number one before the doors opened and the first bells rang in September 2020.

Our schools followed guidance with respect to physical distancing, cohorting, use of space, scheduling, lunch protocols, pick up/drop off protocols, increased cleaning protocols and more to ensure the safety and well-being of our students, families and staff.

Resources were prepared at every level (primary, junior, intermediate and senior) to support health and hygiene in our schools.



Mental health supports

- Online wellness groups (by age) began in August to prepare students for back to school, as well site-based transition back to school programs for students with special needs. Day camps in Pembroke, Renfrew and Arnprior schools gave students and parents a firsthand look at what school would be like in the fall of 2020.
- A virtual mental health office provided daily access to counsellors and social workers for students, parents and staff

- Well-Being Kits were delivered during our second stay-at-home order period. The kits were designed to support students' spiritual, physical and mental health and to offer some experiential learning while helping students find ways to relieve stress. Each kit contained healthy snacks, an exercise mat, exercise bands, relaxation activities and other treats. The kits were hand delivered to students' homes by a member of the Safe Schools or Mental Health Team. The students also received an invite to two cartooning workshops and three breathing, stretching and relaxation sessions. These workshops were offered in partnership with local companies and were conducted virtually.
- Throughout the year and into the summer, virtual grade-specific wellness activities were offered, including 'Fitness Fun Monday, Artist Wednesday, Coding Club Thursday.' Online support sessions and book studies were available to parents as well.

Physical education

A number of exciting physical education programs were delivered to as many students as possible across our board, including snowshoeing, an introduction to orienteering (map, compass, GPS), and archery. Kudos to our teacher volunteers who attended a weekend PD session to become qualified archery teachers. Student feedback was extremely positive!

Community partnerships included the Canadian Tire Jump Start program, CCAC, Shaw Woods and the National Archery in the Schools Program.

The RCCDSB Special Assignment Teacher (SPAT) for Physical Education worked in collaboration with our Mental Health Lead to provide links to 'daily physical activity' among the Virtual Wellness activities for students.

Special "March Break – Give Me a Break Activities" were developed for elementary schools and Summer Institute activities focussed on a holistic view of wellness.

Planning ahead, Ministry funding was secured for the introduction of a cricket program for all schools in the Board in fall 2021.

In addition, work continued with our Indigenous Education Lead to order and distribute Lacrosse equipment to targeted schools with a goal to implement this Indigenous-based program at all of our schools in winter 2022.



Leadership Academy reaffirming for staff

The EOSDN Leadership Academy 2020–2021 helped staff in their roles by providing a framework to be mindful and to self-reflect on their profession.

"It allowed us to develop a mission statement on how we would like to grow both personally and professionally. It also helped us become more confident as leaders and how to effectively connect with people," stated one participant.

ACHIEVEMENT & POTENTIAL

The phrase '21st century learning' took on new meaning in the face of COVID-19. The 2020–21 school year began in-person but pivoted to fully virtual teaching and learning.

Teachers grew their online communication and collaborative skills, for example, through the use of tools such as Jamboard interactive digital whiteboard, while responding to the learning needs of all students through the use of technology.

Preparation and support for remote *teaching*

When you hear the words 'collaboration, creativity, connectedness, sharing', you might automatically connect them to students. During the 2020–2021 school year, these concepts also applied to the support provided to help ensure success as staff pivoted to remote teaching/learning.

Collaboration:

- developed a remote consortia of small Catholic school boards to share students and ensure adequate numbers to accommodate timetables and staff allocation for online learning.
- worked closely with the Ontario E-Learning Consortia (OELC) to develop software for remote learning management and reporting
- worked with staff in the adoption of blended learning classrooms and technological use of online tools for teaching/pedagogically sound practices and strategies

Creativity:

- built and developed online courses and course materials
- worked with the OELC to develop Google integration strategies between boards

Connectedness:

- worked closely with secondary school guidance departments and vice principals to manage/schedule timetables.
- monitored student success and attendance and provide weekly data to student success teachers and attendance teams

RCCDSB educators explored and applied new teaching and learning approaches made possible by the use of technology to increase engagement and improve student learning.

Sharing:

- · ensured employee access to Ministry resources
- worked with the OELC to develop Google integration strategies

All this, along with the purchase of laptops and desktop computers, monitors, webcams, Helpdesk software and more ensured that our staff had the tools they needed!

Preparation and support for remote *learning*

We worked hard to remove barriers to success and improve student achievement in the remote learning setting:

- Wi-Fi enhancements
- Purchase of more than 800 iPads and App licensing for students, more than 1,000 Winbooks and Chromebooks and 115 Kajeet devices
- Purchase of software programs such as Google Enterprise and SeeSaw as well as continued use of Google Classroom and D2L BrightSpace

Literacy

Teachers were provided with professional development to gain proficiency with digital platforms for teaching.

New curriculum supports to ensure a seamless transition between face-to-face and distance learning included:


- RAZ-Plus—Kindergarten to Grade 5 digital literacy program with materials for teachers and engaging reading resources and tools for students.

Student Reading App provides great options





Math

A Professional Development day for staff in September 2020 included a recorded math session to introduce educators to the new math curriculum and available supports, including those already within our schools.

Teachers and students took advantage of many learning tools including:

- Math Up—online Kindergarten to Grade 8 math instruction App
- Zorbit's Math Adventure—exploring curriculum-aligned math concepts in unexpected ways
- GIZMOS and Desmos online programs for Grade 7–12 math and science
- Micro:bits (learning to code), Scratch (block-based visual programming), Tinkercad (online 3D modelling program) to support work in coding in Grade 7–9 classrooms

St. Kateri Tekakwitha Virtual Catholic School

At different periods throughout the 2020–21 school year, virtual learning was a necessity due to the mandated closing of schools, or it was provided as an option for those who wished to opt out of face-to face learning.

For the 400+ students fully opting out of face to face learning during the 2020-21 school year, RCCDSB formed St. Kateri Tekakwitha Virtual Catholic School, which provided and continues to provide a full virtual educational teaching and learning experience at the elementary level.

A combination of synchronous and asynchronous learning engaged teachers and students in effective literacy and numeracy practices five days a week with grade-specific Ontario curriculum.



CATHOLIC VIRTUAL SCHOOL

The beat goes on

The RCCDSB music team successfully adapted to "no singing and no use of shared instruments" during the 2020-21 school year. In-person programming incorporated use of ukulele, guitar, computer coding, rhythm and drumming.

The itinerant teachers were also able to creatively provide both asynchronous and synchronous online music and dance instruction to students when schools were on remote learning.

A music and dance program was also developed and delivered in a completely virtual environment for St. Kateri virtual school.

Pathways

A lot of work was done to increase awareness and promote pathway choices to RCCDSB students, including a credit-based summer program on the trades in partnership with Algonquin College.

Eight high school students (mostly SHSM students) from St. Joseph's High School in Renfrew and Bishop Smith Catholic High School in Pembroke completed a Level 1 Carpentry course during Quad Four of the 2020/21 school year at the Ottawa Valley campus.

In addition, 18 Grade 10 and 11 students from our high schools participated in the first Summer Trade Camp Dual Credit at Algonquin College Ottawa Valley campus.

Through our Experiential Learning Initiative, Coding and 3D Printing developed and expanded into more and more RCCDSB classrooms as the year went on.

French as a Second Language

Our French as a Second Language (FSL) program continues to evolve with updated resources, for example Mathologie for Kindergarten, Frimousses for Grades 1–3, and C'est Parti for junior classes and virtual field trips. In addition to new resources, extended is available in select elementary schools JK-3 as well as some extended French subjects are available to our high school students, as well as the opportunity to earn Diplôme d'Études en Langue Française (DELF) certification.

Efforts to recruit and retain FSL teachers include career fairs, online courses and online conferences.

A number of innovative programs such as Specialist High Skills Majors (SHSM), Dual Credits, and the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYAP) are credited with helping to improve high school graduation rates.

DIGNITY AND BELONGING

Renfrew County Catholic District School Board has been working to increase equity, inclusion and anti-racism education for staff and students.

Equity Table

Some of the goals outlined by the RCCDSB Equity Table were to increase student voice in our planning and to bring equity education to our schools.

To accomplish this, the RCCDSB Equity Table completed two school visits to every Grade 6 and 10 class throughout the system with a focus on anti-racism bias. Student and staff data were collected from the visits.

During the first session, the team educated the classes to deepen their understanding of equity, discrimination, equality, inclusivity and being an ally. They also had an opportunity to engage in conversations with our students about these topics.

During the second visit, the students watched videos depicting different scenarios of discrimination and allyship and were given an opportunity to share their perceptions and experiences with equity and diversity.

The data from these conversations and classroom visits is used to inform our school and board planning.

The members of the equity team were very encouraged by the honesty and empathy shown by students and were impressed with the students' willingness to learn and share ideas. It was another opportunity to witness examples how our RCCDSB students love unconditionally.



Cultural competence training

• RCCDSB secondary staff completed cultural competence and multiple trainings in preparation for implementation of the NBE Grade 11 English course *Understanding Contemporary First Nations, Métis, and Inuit Voices* in 2021–22.

- Chad Solomon, First Nations author, made six virtual presentations to our schools
- Some NBE teachers, guidance, and program team participated in Cultural Safety Training with the Ontario Federation of Indian Friendship Centres.
- One National Indigenous Peoples History Month presentation was provided per day for each school day.

Christian Community Day 2021

RCCDSB was blessed to have an inspiring keynote address from the Honourable Murray Sinclair, Chief Commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) at our Christian Community Day in May 2021. All board staff were involved in an afternoon follow-up session designed to reflect on bias, equity, and antiracism.
